The Prosthodontic Dilemma in Restoring the Periodontally -

In the last twenty years, implant therapy has changed the patient's treatment plan, at

times in a radical manner. Saving extremely compromised teeth by using "traditional

therapies" (endodontics, periodontics, prostheses, etc.) seems not only to have become

more and more obsolete, but no longer justifiable from a cost-benefit ratio, or from

expections of success over the long term. But is this approach really better than the "old

one"? And if so, is it better in all patients? The aim of this lecture is to provide an

answer to these by carefully analyzing the literature and presenting several clinical cases

and the personal own data, in an attempt to evaluate the cost-benefit ratio not only from

an economic, but also from a biological point of view.

Attendee will learn:

1. The benefit but also the limits of periodontal prosthetics and implant therapy in the

rehabilitation of patients affected by severe periodontal disease.

2. To carefully evaluate the cost/benefit ratio in both economical and biological point of

view.

3.To differentiate between dogmas and what is really fundamental for a long-term

successful treatment.

4. To consider the patient as the protagonist of treatment plan.
